

(1) What are these files?

These are PDF files of sticker images. Each image contains a repeating image or set of images which print onto one 8.5 by 11 inch (i.e. US letter) size sheet of paper.

They are designed to be printed onto label (precut sticker) stock, where they will print one image per sticker.

(2) What kind of label stock?

Notice each file name starts with "AveryXXXX." That is the designation for a specific Avery label number.

You can buy Avery labels in most office-supply stores in the US and Canada. The number will be right on the package.

So the "six rectangular stickers per page" images (such as the suffragette image) start with "Avery5164" that means you buy the Avery 5164 labels at the store.

The images are then already perfectly sized to fit on the labels. All you have to do is print them.

(3) How do I print labels?

The labels are a giant thick sheet of "paper" that has the labels pre cut on it, as one giant piece.

You will need to use the "single sheet feed" option on your printer (you don't put the labels into the auto load tray).

Just feed a sheet in (the labels tell you which side is up/front), let the printer suck it in so it's ready to go, then you go to your computer and just hit "print" as you usually do for any PDF. That's it.

The alignment should just work, on a home printer.

However, if you find yourself needing to adjust the alignment (some printers let you move things around by setting offsets etc) then you should print to regular paper (feeding with the same manual feed you will use for the labels, so it's handled the same) and experiment until the images are lining up.

But should go well the first time, on a home printer.

If your print settings allows, you should be sure to set the "paper stock" to "thick" or "label" or similar.
